The Midwinter Storyfest was a frolicsome night. Over 375 people attended, thanks largely to Audrey Bennett's outstanding work producing the concert. We're already looking ahead to the Second Annual Storyfest in '83!

A small number of people from the Guild participated in the Second Annual Storytelling Festival at Whitman College in Walla Walla. Professional storytellers Jay O'Callahan, Laura Simms, The Folktellers, Clare Cuddy, Ron Evans and Spencer Shaw led workshops and told stories in concerts each evening for three and a half days. It was a highly enriching experience that we hope will happen again next year so that more story lovers from Seattle can attend.

The Guild just celebrated its first birthday. This is a milestone not only for the organization itself, but for those of you who joined one year ago. It's time to renew! We have included everyones membership card in this newsletter. (Take a moment here to laugh, cluck disapprovingly, shake your head and/or stamp your feet at our organizational abilities..) We sincerely hope that all of you early Guild supporters whose membership expires in the next month or two will renew your memberships as soon as they expire. April 14: Lovers of literature are in for a treat this month!

Marjorie kennedy, storyteller and teacher at Lakeside
School, will share her gift for bringing literature to
life through storytelling. Come and enjoy the stories
of such writers as James Stevens, Mary Norton, Saki (H.H.
Munroe) and others. Suitable for ages 10 - adult.

Story listeners will be given a taste of the traditional Irish "sean-nos" singing by Joe Heaney, artist-in-residence at the University of Washington's Department of Ethnomusicology. Joe will share ballads and stories as they have been told for generations in Ireland, where the strength of the stories would warm the listeners long after the neglected turf fires had burned out. Suitable for ages 12-adult.

At last, the Guild will present its long-awaited evening of Trickster Tales. Get ready to laugh at, sigh with, and most of all relate to the troublesome tricksters who appear in stories from every culture. Guild members will share their favorite adventures of Br'er Rabbit, Ananse, Jack, Bouki and Coyote to name just a few. Bring the whole family for this playful evening of stories.

Common Threads: A Cross-Cultural Look at Symbolic Motifs in Stories will be the focus of a workshop taught by Merna Hecht on April 21 and April 28 from 7-9 p.m. Merna is a professional storyteller and librarian at the Little School in Bellevue who has a special interest in and knowledge of the use of symbols in stories.
