Several interesting books are available these days to help those of us who want to teach kids how to tell stories. Probably most useful of the lot is CHILDREN TELL STORIES: A TEACHING GUIDE by Martha Hamilton and Mitch Weiss, Beauty and the Beast Storytellers. (Katonah, N.Y.: Richard C. Owen, 1990.) Their listing of the educational benefits of storytelling will be useful to teachers needing to justify story use in the classroom. They also include a chapter on integrating storytelling into the curriculum. Their six week unit on tale selection, tale learning, and performance is fine. An extensive bibliography is appended. I wasn't too excited about the twenty-five short tales they include as Appendix B, but they worked for them.

For a brief look at storytelling with children I suggest "Teaching Children to Tell Stories" in Caroline Feller Bauer's READ

FOR THE FUN OF IT: ACTIVE PROGRAMMING WITH BOOKS FOR CHILDREN. (H.W. Wilson, 1992). I found her comments useful and liked the ten short stories she includes. She also provides an annotated bibliography.

Barbara Budge Griffin's self-published guides to teaching story in the classroom are excellent. If you are teaching kids to tell you will want to own her STUDENTS AS STORYTELLERS: THE LONG AND SHORT OF LEARNING A STORY. She also publishes STUDENT STORYFEST: HOW TO ORGANIZE A STORYTELLING FESTIVAL: STORYTELLER'S JOURNAL: A HANDBOOK FOR STORY RESEARCH AND LEARNING; and STORYTELLER'S WORKBOOK: FORMS FOR ANALYZING A STORY. All are available from Barbara at P.O. Box 626-D, Medford, Oregon 97501-0042. \$14.95 each.

Portland's Larry Watson has also self-published a useful guide: EVERY ONE A STORYTELLER; INTEGRATING STORYTELLING INTO THE CURRICULUM by Harriet Mason and Larry Watson. (Portland, Oregon: Lariat, 1991). Larry and Harriet are approaching story from a creative dramatics base. Lots of story games and activities to stretch the children's imaginations. An approach we can all learn from.

An interesting little publication is

TELLING TALES IN SCHOOLS by

Cathy Spagnoli and Summit School Students. I especially like this because the voice of the children themselves comes through so clearly. Kids have provided the illustrations and many comments throughout. Brief, anecdotal, idea-filled, and fun.
