1997 Storytelling Festival



This is it! The 1997 Storytelling Festival is just a few weeks away! Mark your calendars for October 25th and take a look at the insert enclosed in this newsletter. The festival will be held at the Nordic Heritage Museum in Ballard. Events are divided into two sections:

9:30 — 11:00 a.m.: Pre-Festival Institutes

Two institutes are being offered: Attention-Keeping Techniques by Candace Miller, and Critiquing Session for Storytellers by Gay Ducey. You choose one of the two to attend. You need to register for the pre-festival institutes.

11:00 a.m. — 9:00 p.m.: Storytelling Festival

The festival begins with the Swapping Ground (a chance for you to share your stories with others in the cafeteria) and is followed by four workshops: "Bringing Stories to Life" by Nancy Schimmel; "Laugh or Let the Tears Flow" by Vincent Kituku; "Seed of the Ancient Tale" by Barb Stevens-Newcomb; and "The Tie that Binds" by Gay Ducey; followed by a family concert and an evening concert featuring Gay Ducey, Vincent Kituku, Candace Miller, Nancy Schimmel, and Barb-Stevens Newcomb. *You do not need to register for the festival itself ahead of time — only register for the pre-festival institutes.*

We know you are going to have a wonderful time at the festival because the tellers who will be presenting and sharing with us are fabulous. This is a busy time of year, so be sure to put the enclosed insert up on your refrigerator for easy reference and reminder.

We look forward to seeing you on October 25th in Ballard.

he pungent scent of autumn fills the air and stories are in the wind. Serious...you're sure to catch wind of it as we welcome visiting storyteller Jim Weiss, send local storyteller Linda Scott off to China, create crafty stories with Debbie Deutsch, and re-live history with Debbie Dimitre. Our friends at Island Books host an entire season of Saturday programs for children, and the Nordic Heritage Museum, All For Kids and the Roadrunner Coffeehouse continue to host events sponsored by the Seattle Storytellers Guild. Below are some brief descriptions of programs and concerts coming

this fall. Check the Calendar for specific dates and times.

September begins with series of storytelling from both Debbie Dimitre and Debbie Deutsch. Debbie Dimitre takes "Patchwork Patriots" to King County Libraries, bringing to life two Revolutionary War heroines. By the glow of a kerosene lamp, in costume and in character, Debbie

weaves the courageous tales of Molly Pitcher and Elizabeth Zane. This living history presentation is sure to capture the hearts of young and old alike. Ages 6 and up. Check the calendar for library locations. (Free)

Debbie Deutsch offers a craft activity with storytelling several times thoughout the fall. Dates and times are in the calendar. Debbie presents her programs at the Pacific Science Center, 200 Second Avenue North Saturdays at 10:30 am and 1 pm, September, November, December and January. For more information, call (206) 443-2001.

Island Books (3014 - 78th Ave., SE, Mercer Island; 206/232-6920) has free storytelling Saturdays from 11-11:30 a.m. Many of the best loved storytellers in the area are featured in this series recommended for age 3 and up. Look for "Island Books" in the calendar.

The Roadrunner Coffeehouse in Wallingford continues to host the Third Sunday featured tellers brought in by the Guild. The fall line-up starts with tandem tellers Camille Wooden and Dawn Kuhlman on

September 21. Camille and Dawn will help us ease into fall with a program titled "The Way We Like It." We're sure you'll like it whatever way they tell it! Then October 19, it's our neighbors from the South back by popular demand in the "Tahoma Guild Potpourri." On November 16 Valerie Moriarty, who couldn't make it in July, makes a comeback with "A Northern Heart with a Southern Twang." We're so glad this island teller will share her personal stories with us. And finally, December 21, an old tradition in our new home at Roadrunner – The Annual Holiday Poutpourri. It's an afternoon of seasonal stories,



warm beverages and scrumptious goodies. The Roadrunner Coffeehouse is located at 2123 N. 40th Avenue, (206) 547-3559. The Third Sunday featured program begins at 1:00 p.m. (but be sure to stop in early and get a fabulous brunch or lunch while you wait!)

Open mike follows at 2 p.m. If you are interested in performing at the open mike, please be sure to limit your stories to 7-8 minutes. Cost of the Third Sunday storytelling events is \$3.

Also at the Roadrunner is the Tellebration Concert on November 22. Several local tellers will be featured, as well as a workshop during the day to be held at All For Kids Bookstore, 2900 NE Blakely St., (206) 526-2768 (see page 3). All for Kids will also provide space for the Beginning Storyteller's Workshop Sept 27, Oct 4 & 11, and will present Jim Weiss telling stories when he comes to Bainbridge Island in October (see page 5).

And finally, be sure to read the article and mark the calendar for the Northwest Storytellering Festival on October 25 at the Nordic Heritage Museum. We have a wonderful line up of storytellers and pre festival institutes are offered with Gay Ducey and Nancy Schimmel. It's a "don't miss" for sure.

Got an earful yet? Well, keep listening, because we'll make sure your ears get their fill.

November 22, A Full Day of Tellebration

November is Tellebration time and this year the Guild has planned something extra special. In addition to the two-hour evening concert, held this year at Roadrunner Coffeehouse in Wallingford, the Guild is sponsoring two workshops that day given by storytellers Jana Dean and Rebecca Chamberlain. The two workshop entitled "Journey Into the Natural World" and "Journey into the Other World," designed to be taken together, will be presented collaboratively by the two tellers.

Both Jana Dean and Rebecca Chamberlain are well known story tellers and natural historians in the Pacific Northwest. In addition, they are accomplished teachers of the art of storytelling. Workshops will be held at All For Kids Bookstore, 2900 NE Blakely St from 9:30-11:30 am and 12:00-1:30 pm. And as a special bonus, your \$30 registration comes with a free ticket to the evening Tellebration Concert.

The evening concert at the Roadrunner Coffeehouse in Wallingford will feature six fine Northwest tellers including Rebecca Chamberlain and Jana Dean. Also performing at the evening concert are Rita Howard, Susan Blaine, Lawrence Col, and Maggie Bennet with her wonderful music and Irish Harp. Because space is limited on both the classes and the concert we ask you to preregister for the workshops and reserve space for the concert to insure a good seat. We will sell tickets at the door on a space-available basis.

Sources: About Stories and the Folks Who Tell Them

s the Seattle Storytelling Guild Festival is coming up in October, I thought it a good time to do a little pre-festival reading. Festival teller, Dr. Vincent Muli Wa Kituku, has a new book out. EAST AFRICAN FOLKTALES: FROM THE VOICE OF MUKAMBA (August House, 1997) includes 18 brief tales recalled from his Kenyan child-hood. The author notes that in Kamba tradition interpretation of the moral is left to the listener, however he provides us with explications for each story. I was especially pleased that the publishers have included the texts for these tales both in English and in their original language. Such bi-lingual publishing is seldom seen, and is to be applauded.

Nancy Shimmel will be appearing at Festival this year too, so this is a good time to re-read her wonderful JUST ENOUGH TO MAKE A STORY: A SOURCEBOOK FOR STORYTELLING (Sisters' Choice Press, 1992). That title has been recommended in this column several times already as it is one of my own favorite sources for beginning tellers. It should be available at all public libraries. And while you are there check for Nancy's tapes. PLUM PUDDING (Sister's Choice, 1982) is a delightful collection of songs and stories.

Barb Stevens-Newcomb, another Festival performer, just released THE DAUGHTERS OF ISHI-SHINI (Black Cricket Press, 1996). This is available in both cassette and CD. The work was named to the 1997 ALA Notable Recording list. This reviewer hasn't had a chance to listen yet, unfortunately.

Now on to other works. Two new books have crossed my desk which deserve attention. Joseph Bruchac's TELL ME A TALE: A BOOK ABOUT STORYTELLING (Harcourt Brace, 1997) is an anecdotal personal journey of storytelling advice. Bruchac includes fourteen stories nested within his discussion. The book is addressed to the beginning teller, but it might require a dedicated beginner to approach storytelling through this format. Those already on the storytelling path, however, will find much to enjoy here.

Local teller Jana Dean will be offering a workshop during the festival. So this might be a good time to check out WETLAND TALES: A COLLECTION OF STORIES FOR WETLAND EDUCATION (Washington Department of Ecology, 1992). The book was available free from that department at one time and may still be. It is a very useful collection of tales on wetland themes. Most local libraries have a copy.

Storyteller Nina Jaffe proves herself to be a fine writer with A VOICE OF THE PEOPLE: THE LIFE AND WORK OF HAROLD COURLANDER (Henry Hold, 1997). Based on taped interviews with Courlander in the last few years of his life, and on extensive research into Courlander's career, Jaffe has produced a fascinating and introspective biography of this man who provided us with such a wealth of story collections drawn from his own African and Caribbean connections.

Congratulations to Bruce Smith

of Yelm Washington. Bruce, a former member of Olympia, Mt. Tahoma, and the Seattle Storyteller's guilds, recently travelled to Millerport Ohio as an alternate finalist in the 1997 Storyteller of the Year Competition. Bruce placed third and is out East telling stories until late fall. When he returns around Tellebration time, Bruce will have many exciting stories to share.

To hear Weiss tell any of his 18 different recordings is to become enthralled in the classic tales. It may be a Greek myth or a Sherlock Holmes mystery or an original spooky Halloween story. It is no wonder that young children leave Weiss's performances determined to recreate the drama in their own creative play. Jim Weiss believes that the joyful success of reading and writing begins on the lap of a storyteller. Don't miss this opportunity! Tickets are \$5 for children, \$10 for adults.
