Come share the fire as the Seattle Storytellers' Guild honors our own Vi Hilbert. Vi Hilbert is an Upper Skagit elder, who has made it her life's work to preserve the stories of the First People of this land, and to perpetuate the tradition of storytelling for us all. Vi Hilbert is the founder and director of Lushootseed Research, a non-profit organization dedicated to researching and preserving the culture of her people. An Associate Professor of American Indian Studies, she taught the Lushootseed language, culture, and literature at the University of Washington for fifteen years. She also taught courses for Evergreen College in Olympia, and is still in demand as a presenter at conferences and festivals both nationally and internationally. She has been the subject of documentaries as far afield as Welsh National TV, and much closer to home in such works as Glimpses Into Northwest Lives: Some Outstanding Women. Among her many honors, too numerous to list, she was declared a Washington State Living Treasure by Governor Booth Gardner, and was named a National Heritage Fellow by the National Endowment for the Arts. She received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Storytelling Association, and last year Vi was flown to Washington, D.C. to be presented the prestigious Ethnic Heritage Award by the First Lady, Hilary Clinton. Some years ago the Seattle Storytellers' Guild presented her with an honorary Lifetime Membership.

But any time is a good time to count one's blessings, and we are the most fortunate to have one living in our midst. On Saturday, April 24, at the Nordic Heritage Museum, from 2:00 - 4:30 pm, the Seattle Storytellers' Guild is proud and pleased to host a joyful gathering to pay our respects to Vi Hilbert, and to thank her once again for helping us all to remember what storytelling, at its very heart, is all about.

Come join us for an afternoon of visiting and refreshments, followed by a very special program. When asked how we might best express our gratitude, the Great Grandmother of the Storytellers' Guild did not hesitate before replying. The greatest gift we could give her, she said, would be a story, told from the hearts, and a sacred commitment to keep the storyfires bringing in our lives, in our hearts, in our souls. Cathy Spagnoli has THREE new books out! I haven?t seen her August House title yet, but did manage to get my hands on A TREASURY OF ASIAN STORIES & ACTIVITIES FOR SCHOOLS & LIBRARIES (Fort Atkinson, Wisc.: Alleyside Press, 1998. This is a teacher activity book with twenty short, tellable Asian folktales, brief info on the country, a simple activity to accompany each tale, and a short list of picture books to expand the unit. Teachers and librarians will find useful ideas here and good stories.

Cathy and her husband, Paramasivam Samanna have teamed up to prepare JASMINE AND COCONUTS: SOUTH INDIAN TALES (Englewood, CO.: Libraries Unlimited, 1999). We are so fortunate to have this collection from Cathy and Paramasivam. They share cultural information as well as wonderful stories here. An excellent introduction to South India. Interesting stories, skillfully presented. Good tale notes and bibliographies for both books too.

Another new title in the Libraries Unlimited World Folklore Series is Lilian Nerette Louis?s WHEN NIGHT

FALLS, KRIC! KRAC! HAITIAN FOLKTALES

(Libraries Unlimited, 1999). Lots of cultural information provided and fascinating stories. Those who have enjoyed Diane Wolkstein?s MAGIC ORANGE TREE will enjoy this further foray into the magic of Haitian telling.

Seattle?s storytellers never stop! Meg Lippert and Won-Ldy Paye also have a new book out. WHY LEOPARD HAS SPOTS: DAN STORIES FROM LIBERIA by Won-Ldy Paye and Margaret H. Lippert (Fulcrum Publishing, 1998) is a charming collection created especially for the reading delight of children. Six of Won-Ldy?s folktales have been retold in an engaging style by Meg (with considerable input from Won-Ldy to make sure everything is just right). And Ashley Bryan provides handsome black and white woodcuts for each tale. Having enjoyed Won-Ldy?s inimitable tales for years, it is great to see them finally in print!

And yes, I did read something new by a non-Seattle teller. Joseph Bruchac?s autobiographical BOWMAN?S STORE: A JOURNEY TO MYSELF (Dial Books, 1997) was an unexpectedly sweet journey into Bruchac?s childhood and teen years. Mostly though it is an affectionate remembrance of Jesse Bowman, the grandfather who raised Joe and of the family and friends around his grandfather?s store. It is also a journey to discover his own ancestry, for, though his grandfather would not speak of it, Joe realized that his grandfather was of Abenaki descent.

Tell It All For Children's Guild was born out of enthusiasm for storytelling. In 1997, two founding guild members attended the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough. When they entered the festival grounds they knew nothing of storytelling, but within hours were enthralled and returned home determine to spread the word about this entertaining, enriching and powerful art. Allison is a professional storyteller, a therapist, social worker, public health educator and health promotion specialist and was the chairperson for the Storytelling as Prevention Conference. David currently works as health planner for the Washington State Board of Health, writes stories, and has extensive background in editing, publishing, marketing books, and was publisher and an author of Spinning Tales, Weaving Hope: Stories of Peace, Justice, and the Environment (New Society Publishers, 1992).
