> First Fridays Story Swaps on Zoom (except April)

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This is our 2022 - 2023 Season Review Issue. But it is time also to look ahead.

In our third season on Zoom, we had some outstanding featured tellers, including Paul Strickland, Alicia Retes and BZ Smith, Diane Fertlatte, Margaret Read McDonald, Tom Rawson, and Steve Daut, and an assortment of others. StoryFest Swapping at our live Golden Circle event, telling spooky tales in October, and lies in May. Our big event was January's two day ticketed Crones Tales, organized by Jen Stone, with sixteen regional tellers - it has 105 in attendance over the four sessions. Zoom attendance has ranged mostly from seven to the mid-thirties, with fifty eight for our Tellabration tm. There was one virtual and one live workshop. About a dozen or so swapped yarns at monthly First Friday Swaps.

What lies ahead for us?


Virtual events on Zoom? Possibly even hybrid - live and virtual. Or Live Storytelling at our StoryFests and face-to-face Swaps? House or coffee shop concerts? Storytelling for seniors? Or things entirely new? Any of this requires a team of volunteers.

What will it take to continue with Zoom events? Yes, they cost money, we pay between \$50 to \$500 each for storytellers and Zoom costs too. It adds up. Grants help—but getting them takes real effort, ask Anne. We would like to see both an increase in virtual attendance, plus more folks making donations.

What would it take for us to go back to those wonderful live events? They are what build our sense of community! An affordable venue easy to get to with parking. Volunteers arranging for nearby storytellers and get the word out to folks. More volunteers to come and help set up the chairs, stage and sound equipment, to welcome folks, provide refreshments, and straighten up afterwards. Most of all, enough people who are enthusiastic about storytelling to make the effort to come even at night in Seattle - to listen, enjoy, and donate.

A new season begins with our planning in the Summer. With volunteers to organize the events, arrange for tellers and publicize them, to host or emcee, whether virtual or not. If we go live, we need someone to find a venue, and many others for all those additional things needed. Age and health concerns have seriously reduced the number of our volunteers. Six board members have passed on in recent years most recently Patty Zeitlin (see pages 9 &10). Some have moved away. Of those who remain many have already offered years of service.

Prospects are good for the Seattle Storytellers Guild. We can see a revival in live



oral storytelling here and a new generation of storytellers rise up. And continue to enjoy friends far and near. NSN's 2024 Conference will be right here in Seattle!! All it takes is a few more story enthusiasts to volunteer to join in. Like you!

Fanning The Embers March 31st -April 2nd, 2023: A Review

Fanning the Embers, a Northwest Storytellers Retreat, started as a way for tellers to connect with other tellers. The opportunity to be together for three days in a relaxed, yet focused, setting to share and develop stories. FTE focuses on connection, support and rekindling energies. Long, long ago, in 2004, Fanning the Embers began as a one-day get together in a small cabin at a county park near Olympia, WA. Interest was high and the desire to keep the flames burning was fueled and still burns. In the years since

FTE's creation tellers have gathered without fail. The location has changed at times; at times we have only met on small screens from our individual locations; but despite the dampening circumstances, FTE has flamed on.





Several Seattle Storytellers Guild members attended this year. Here are some comments from them:

"What a wonderful weekend! The food, surroundings, and, of course the people and stories were all enjoyable and healing. I told two stories: The Three Little Pigs from the Wolf's Point of View and Trees. The second is a tall tale of my making regarding the fruit trees' satisfaction with being open canopy or trellised. Saturday consisted of two workshops. The first involved body work taking on various characters and emotions in our bodies. The second was led by Eva Abram regarding how to put a story together and things to think about while writing and editing. Then we worked in small groups on a story we wanted to work on. I worked on a vignette from The Prince of Tides by Pat Conroy. It's nowhere near ready, but worth working on I think."

"In previous years at Fanning the Embers, I would work on a new story and perform it for the first time. This year I took stories I was already comfortable with so I could expand my skills in the performance aspect of telling. I was able to be more aware of how the audience was receiving me and found I could reach out and engage with them in a way I hadn't before. The relationships formed and deepened in this event help us not only with our own development as tellers but in our ability to contribute to the local storyteller's communities. I even had a wonderful conversation with another teller about how we serve the story and allow it to come through us."

"I have to confess that before the weekend really got going, I was feeling discouraged and disheartened about my role in the story world. Like Tinkerbell, in "Peter Pan", my flame was barely flickering. To be with such a coterie of like-minded people who treasure the art and the communication of stories never fails to rekindle the spark of my story-telling flame. Listening and watching others tell their stories is a powerful aid of learning. Now I feel more the way I am used to, alive with my passion for telling stories. The entire weekend was so valuable and powerful."

Our Folklife 2023 events began with Tantalizing Tales on Friday afternoon at 5:30pm in the Center Theatre. Barry McWilliams emceed. NW Folklife was just getting set up, still we had around 30 who enjoyed the storytelling. Storyteller Leighona Cara of Majestic Adventures, a Bellingham outdoor experiential educational program that offers "role playing quests" for groups of children, ages 6-18, with the help of three volunteers - two were children - from the audience, took us on an fantasy adventure, Leighona played all the creatures encountered — a sea captain, a sea gull, a banshee, a leprechaun, etc. Then Tom Rawson (who recently moved to Vancouver, B.C.) retold stories from Margaret Read MacDonald (*The Rooster*) and Jackie Torrance (*Brer Raccoon and the Frogs*) with the audience chanting along with him, followed by a story song on his uke. Tom and his wife made several more musical appearances at Folklife.

The Guild's **Ghost Stories** session at the **2023 FolkLife Festival** was held in the Eve Alford Theater, from 7 to 9pm on May 27th. The MC was Karen Shaw who introduced the tellers. Three tellers: **Sarah Comer, Mary Anne Moorman** and **Larry Hohm**, who told Ghost stories of different styles: folk, personal stories with mysterious flavors, and literary, all of which were very well received by the audience - there were over 100 audience members in attendance. There was quite a range of age diversity, racial representation, and a balanced gender mix. Judith Alexander and Bu Huang set up the information table at the entrance of the theater, encouraging them to take fliers and signup for our mailing list.

I had a great time being MC for the **Liars Contest** at the **NW Folklife Festival 2023**. There were 8 tellers in all and about 90 people in attendance. Judith Anderson, Kurt Von Laven, and Alice Enevoldsen were judges while Larry Hohm was the timer. Because we had only one hour for the show, stories were limited to 5 minutes, though many went a little over. Those who went over were not disqualified, but lost points. The Youth Prize went to 11 year old Leaf (sorry, did not get a full name b/c he was added at the last minute) who told a ramble about *Running Along on a Deserted Road*. His trophy was pineapple shaped and he mentioned a pineapple in his story - so clever! Third prize went to Colleen Bollen's *Best and Worst*; and Second prize to Jen Stone's *Trouble with Cybersecurity*. First prize went to Ted Judd from Bellingham for his *Skagit Bridge*. We (SSG) hope to have more time next year so stories can be the usual 8 minutes. While the judges were choosing the winners, I got to tell two lies: *The Biggest Liar* (thank you Judith for the story lead) and *My Father Always Wanted to be an Orchestra Conductor* (an original tall tale written by yours truly). What fun!!

Singer, songwriter, storyteller and non-violent communication teacher and practitioner **Patty Zeitlin** died on St. Patrick's day after many months battling cancer. We are all deeply saddened by her death. She was beloved by so many of us. This was apparent during her stay in nursing care where the staff was repeatedly astounded by how many people came to see her day and night. During her time in hospice - the last month or so of her life - she was surrounded and supported by her many friends.

Born as **Patricia A Pattison**, on June 25th, 1936, her first years were on a small farm near Council Bluffs Iowa, before moving with her single mom, Anne Dorothea Eklund, and her Grandfather Rollo Eklund to Arkansas and then to a little house in South L.A. After college and a time as an pre-school teacher, her life journey led first into teaching and training early childhood teachers, writing and recording albums of songs for children and adults, and writing plays and children's musicals, books, poetry and scripts. Then later in her life in counseling and storytelling.

Patty wrote of herself: "My life journey has taken me into teaching and training early childhood teachers, writing and recording songs for children and adults, writing books, poetry and scripts, and even performing with a puppet troupe. I've always attempted to inspire compassion though my creative work, and to bring about more peace personally, and for others. Teaching and sharing Marshall Rosenberg's work of NVC combines my values, many of my skills and my love of working with people. It brings me great joy to see others learn and experience what I have, using NVC, that is more love, self-worth, and less fear in their lives. I've practiced co-counseling for many years, taken Landmark Education courses, and received an M.A. in Human Development and Adult. Ed. from Pacific Oaks College. I love to explore new horizons that deepen and enhance my life and practice."

Patty tells in <u>A Song is a Rainbow</u>, her 1982 book on teaching music to younger children, of her own musical learning. She had a natural talent for picking out chords and playing by ear and learned the piano and organ mostly on her own by ear. She first learned to play the guitar with banjo tuning, later having to learn the chords over again. It wasn't until much later she learned to read musical notation. She had the ability to remember songs, just from hearing them a few times..

She will be remembered for the wonderful songs she wrote and performed as well as the stories - both folktales and personal - she told that were blooming with her delight in life where her cheerful optimism poured through. Patty's "Bullfrog Ballades" website (www.pattyzeitlin.com) is full of rich details about her career and accomplishments including some of her songs and CDs which can be purchased there. If you are one of the few who didn't meet Patty or want to know more about this amazing woman, and get a taste of her talents, you can find recordings on Patty's YouTube channel.

Patty was married for a time to David Zeitlin, a folksinger and music teacher at Jake McCabe's Guitar Shop in Santa Monica - at that time, a center of the folk music movement in Southern California. Teaming up with folksingers Marcia Berman* and David Zeitlin, she produced a number of impressive albums of children's songs that showed respect and helped children express feelings. As part of Children's Artists Making a Living (CAMAL), they were among the West Coast forerunners for the Children's Music Network. Patty's songs were performed and/or recorded by Pete Seeger, Arlo Guthrie, Tickle Tune Typhoon, The Count (Sesame Street), and a host of others. Mister Rogers was enthusiastic about her work. She received numerous awards and grants for her work. Beginning in 1960, she traveled throughout Canada, parts of the U.S. (including Hawaii), and Taiwan, leading teacher workshops, lecturing, and doing concerts. Patty wrote music, lyrics and performed with the Troubadour Puppeteer Troupe in bilingual musical productions in Watts and East Los Angeles for eight years. She wrote Winnie the Pooh's cripts (on language development) for Walt Disney Studios and was a script consultant and songwriter for Bailey Films. She wrote 300 songs. Here is a video remembering Patty.

In the video, A Celebration of Marcia Berman, Patty Zeitlin appears and we get also get glimpses
of Patty's days in children's music.

Inspired by Dr. Marshall Rosenberg, after a several years with **The Center for Non-Violent Communication (NVC)** as a teacher, she moved to Seattle in 1992 and was one of the core founders of **Northwest Compassionate Communication** where she was a NVC trainer and counselor for many years. Her long experience as an Non-Violent Communication (NVC) teacher was apparent in many meetings and gatherings where she encouraged thoughtful, caring, and openness for the feelings and needs of everyone.

She loved the **Seattle Storytellers Guild** very much. She first joined it around 1999 when she was well into her sixties. There were few events where she was not present. She served actively on its Board after 2013 including a number of years as Vice President. In 2019, at the age of 83, the Guild honored her as a Golden Circle Member. The Guild frequently used the community room at her trailer park for board meetings. She was determined that they would make decisions together as a board. And that they honor and appreciate each other. This began with making sure everyone participated in checking in at the start of every meeting so all voices were heard from the get-go. She was always quick to call around if there were worries regarding the Guild. Patty's final live story, told in September 2022 was about her grandfather, and can be watched **here**.

She had a knack for meeting people and making connections with community and that served the Seattle Storytellers Guild so well over the years especially in finding venues. She was the one who discovered the Bridge coffee house where monthly story circles for years were hosted by Cynthia Westby, and then, the Haller Lake Methodist Church nearby when a new venue was needed to replace the Bridge. She also connected the Guild with the Shoreline Unitarian Universalist church where she was a member, as a venue for several large gatherings. She was a frequent storyteller at her church during their Sunday services. She always insisted stories must be told, not read - encouraging eye contact and real connection.

Her fantastic 2010 video: **Zap the Crap out of Health Care** is on a friend's Youtube channel: at You can see in it, she had a strong sense of justice and was willing to get in there and fight to protect people's rights, especially those who were ignored by the wealthy and the politically powerful. When developers bought the trailer home park in Seattle that was set aside as low income housing for seniors, with the intention of removing the trailers and building on this property near Aurora, she found lawyers and called this community together, to fight to save their homes and demand that the developers honor the city's agreement.

Storyteller Norm Brecke wrote: "She was an inspiration to all. What an amazingly kind heart Patty had. She had that way of making everyone feel special; special people do that. What a gift to the world. I am grateful to have met her. I am grateful to have had one on one conversations with her. Love is all around, you just need the right kind of eyes to see it."

Patty was a very special force in all our lives and those of us who knew her were the richer for her presence.
