
JUNE 9:

Workshops

WRITING AND TELLING: TO MAKE A STORY LIVE. This is a workshop for people who have collected stories from experience or other' lives who would like to learn how to explore and develop those stories through writing. The relationship between writing and telling will also be part of the study. The workshop will be taught by Margaret Scarborough, PhD., visiting faculty member at the University of Washington. The workshop will consist of four seesions held on July 20 and 27 and August 3 and 10 from 3-5 pm or 7:30-9:30.
