Bringing Home the Bacon from the Storytelling Conference

You can approach the July national conference two ways: free-flowing or goal-oriented. Both ways will get results because just being around so many storytellers and storytellers and stories will change you. So just go and soak up the stories and the people. Or go with some goals in mind to help further your growth as a storyteller.

I recommend goal setting to get "more bang for your buck." Even when I went to my first tiny storytelling gathering in Tennessee, I wrote down things I wanted to accomplish. Secretly in my heart of hearts, I wanted to be an instant mega-star and make a million bucks. What did I know? Luckily, I had more realistic goals such as "Buy books with ghost stories."

Here are some suggestions to help you get the most from your experience:

Before the conference:

- 1. Pick a focus for your storytelling. Do some hard thinking about how you want to use storytelling in your life. Are you interested in beginning to use storytelling in your classroom? Are you needing advice on starting to perform professionally?
- 2. Acquaint yourself with the program and the presenters:
- Read the conference schedule and tentatively circle the presentations that will address your focus.
- Review the presenters' books and tapes before you attend. Margaret Read MacDonald had an excellent resource list in the spring issue of *In the Wind*. Take this list to a King County Library and use the computer to have available resources sent to your home.
- Attend the library performances of out-ofstate tellers which are listed in this issue.
- 3. Write down your goals in the notebook you will carry to the conference. Some suggested goals:
- Hear new tellers.
- · Make new friends from your area.
- Make a new friend from out of state.
- Specifically observe performance technique; example: how tellers use their hands.
- Buy tapes and books about your favorite topic. (Chauni Haslet of All for Kids will have an excellent selection of resources).

During the conference:

- 1. Be present in heart, mind and soul. Show up early. Talk to strangers. Ask questions. Join in!
- 2. Pat Peterson's favorite tip is "collect papers." Gather brochures, fliers, reading lists and save them in a big folder.
- 3. After each presentation, write out what you learned. Simply taking notes is easy for me, but I get more out a session when I discipline myself to analyze and write one sentence about how the information applies to me.

After the conference:

- 1. Review and file away your notes and papers.
- 2. Write postcards to new friends to say "I'm glad I met ya."
- 3. Start using those resources.
- 4. Set a new goal for your next step in storytelling. Finally, perhaps the best way to take something home from the conference is to put something into it—Volunteer! Call Avis Jobrack, 752-7297.

A new addition to our NAPPS Conference program! George Shannon will be speaking at 10:30 on Friday, July 9. He fills a slot vacated when Diane Wolkstein found she could not attend. So stop reading the Wolkstein bibliography I gave you last issue and start in on George's books. George is probably best known to you as the author of Stories to Solve: Courtales from Around the World (Greenwillow, 1985) and More Stories to Solve (Greenwillow, 1991). Each contains well-told elaborations of riddle tales from around the world. George will demonstrate the use of some of these tales in storytime settings. As former children's librarian and touring storyteller, George knows our needs well. His picture books Dance Away (illus. by Jose Aruego, Greenwillow, 1982) and Lizard's Song (illus. by Jose Aruego, Greenwillow, 1981) are delightful read-alouds for storytime and tell beautifully. I often recommend them to beginning tellers as the illustrated version makes them easy to learn, and the sure-fire texts never fail to



delight. Another storytelling favorite is George's Piney Woods Peddlar (Greenwillow, 1981). George is also the author of The Knock at the Door: Oryx Multicultural Folktale Series (Oryx, 1992), a collection of variants of "The Wolf and the Seven Little Kids"; Storytelling: A Selected Annotated Bibliography (written with Ellis Greene) Garlord, 1986); Folk Literature and Children: an Annotated Bibliography (Greenwood, 1981); Young adult novel, Unlived Affections (Harper Collins, 1989); and numerous other titles. Best of all, George is moving to Seattle! He will soon be living on Bainbridge Island. So let's take this opportunity to welcome George to our area.
