The PowellsWood Storytelling Festival is coming July 26-27! Plan now for your time at the second gathering of this great summer festival.

Friday Workshops: Donald Davis is exploring the use of storytelling to lead to a written tale in "Think It . . . Tell It . . . Write It!" (9 a.m.–noon). He says this is a good follow-up for those who took his workshop last year, though first-time participants are, of course, welcome. Syd Lieberman is helping us think about "Finding the Story in History and the History in Story" (1–3:30 p.m.). He will demonstrate how to create a historical narrative or enrich a personal story with historical details. Syd has created many historical narratives and is a master of this art. For those who sign up for the whole day, we end with a "Tea with the Tellers"—tea in the garden with Diane Powell's delicious goodies and a chance to chat with our tellers.

Saturday Telling: The opening concert is at 10 a.m., closing olio 3:30–5 p.m. In between you can hear Syd Lieberman's "Abraham and Isaac: Sacrifice at Gettysburg," spend an hour with Donald Davis's personal tales, hear Heather Forest recount her "Life, Death, and String Beans: Tales from a Gardener" (all in the Woodland Tent); or catch sets with Chennai teller Jeeva Raghunath, Margaret Read MacDonald and Richard Scholtz, and Donald, Syd, and Heather in our Perennial Garden Tent and Spring Garden Tent.



Donald Davis is much loved for his personal stories of growing up in North Carolina and his tales of travels. Syd Lieberman draws inspiration from his Jewish heritage and shapes stories from his family life and historical events. Heather Forest creates musical fables and is known for her wisdom tales. She also makes a living as a gardener! So her appearance at this festival is especially apt. Margaret Read MacDonald appears with Richard Scholtz, whose autoharp and mountain dulcimer create a spoken word and music duet.

Note that this event is out-of-doors in a garden. So come prepared for whatever weather the day may bring. Saturday there will be sandwiches, ice cream, and lattes for purchase. Those who come on Friday may pre-order lunch boxes.

The full festival is \$120 (including both workshops, tea, and all day Saturday). Saturday alone is just \$10! (\$5 for children and \$20 for an entire family.)

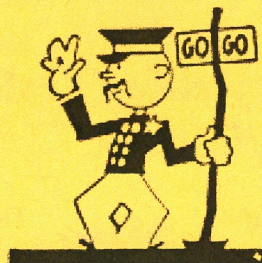

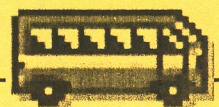

It's happening again! The nineteenth annual Forest Storytelling Festival will be held October 18 through 21 at Peninsula College in Port Angeles. Once again we have an outstanding lineup of featured performers for the 2013 festival.

Andy Offutt Irwin is the headliner for the upcoming Forest Storytelling Festival, last appearing at this festival in 2009. A native of Covington, Georgia, Andy started out in comedy, but added music and storytelling because he had a lot more to say. In storytelling circles, he is especially known for relating the adventures of his eighty-five-year-old aunt, Marguerite Van Camp, M.D. An award-winning recording artist, Andy performs at festivals, theaters, and schools throughout the United States.



Meg Philp is a native of Scotland who migrated to Queensland, Australia, at the age of twenty-five. Her storytelling journey was launched in 1988 when she received a Winston Churchill Fellowship to travel to the great storytelling centers of the United States and Canada. Meg is a teacher and librarian who performs at festivals, conferences, libraries, churches, schools, and museums.

Mary Hamilton entertains audiences of all ages with her native Kentucky tales, world folk and fairy tales, plus a few myths, legends, and personal stories. Her award-winning work has delighted audiences at festivals throughout the country, and she performs as well at universities, schools, museums, and libraries. She also teaches storytelling and is sought-after in schools as an artist in residence.



Anne Rutherford is a lively and musical teller from the Portland, Oregon, area. Her specialties are original and vintage stories of humor and adventure, trickster tales, supernatural tales, and Northwest folklore. Although she swears that all her tales are true, be forewarned that Anne is a two-time winner of the Liars' Contest at the Northwest Folklife Festival.

Earth Day 2013 *by Ellin Huttel*

The festivities at the Duwamish Longhouse began with a "Welcoming Song" from Becca Kirk, Klamath Ojibwe, leader of Red Eagle Soaring youth theater. Elaine Grinnell, Jamestown S'Klallam tribal elder, started the storytelling with a personal story of when she met natives from outside her own tribal culture at a conference in Arizona, and she shared the insights and joy that experience brought her. Ha?qwenith Grinnell—Hawk, Elaine's grandson—told a traditional tale, full of things impossible but beautiful, in the way only a story can.

After the refreshments break, Richard Pauli's words proved to be very stimulating—a teller who could enlighten us by the use of metaphors, clarifying the cant of earth scientists that all too often eludes us. To bring



the afternoon to a close, SSG's own John Wasko told a fantastic tale of the destruction and recreation of our universe.

The rich tapestry of stories told notwithstanding, SSG's recent Earth Day concert was highlighted by the rich and warm feelings of community it engendered. Our greeter and facilitator, Linda Dombrowsky, was second to none in energy, generosity, and helpfulness. To experience the longhouse itself is to be filled with joy by its beauty, spirituality, and serenity. And, to the end, the mutual acceptance of one another by all the attendees, from tribal chairwoman Celia Hansen's welcoming greetings to the tireless efforts of the parking attendant, created an environment that could and should be realized every day—not just on Earth Day.

Bainbridge Island storyteller and SSG member Jeff Leinaweaver will be performing at the National Storytelling Festival in Virginia this August.

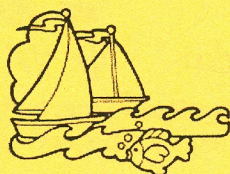
