Golden Circle Honorees 2019

The event on May 17th, 2019 was hosted by Judith Alexander and Norm Brecke. Presentations were made by Pat Peterson, who also stood in for Eva Abram, Judith, and Norm. Mary Brugh and Tom Galt were unable to attend.

Storytellers John Wasko, Mary Brugh, Patty Zeitlin, Tom Galt and George Neiswanger were lauded for their service to the Seattle Storytellers Guild and their contributions and achievements in storytelling and were awarded Golden

Circle Certificates. Stories by George Neiswanger, who brought a chocolate cake as a visual aid, by John Wasko, Patty Zeitlin and Virginia Rankin, who is also a Golden Circle member of the Guild.



John Wasko Although John served on the Board for several years, and as Membership Chair, his contributions often take place behind the scenes— creating the lighting for Haller Lake, advising the Board in email discussions, reconciling Board decisions with Bylaws, smoothing the way for decisions when differing points of view crop up. His warm stories, mostly personal, have entertained not only the Guild, but also the Forest Storytelling Festival audiences. In 2007, John recorded and produced by all himself 150 Anniversary CD's for sale as an incentive for Guild membership—which doubled!

Mary Brugh was a fiddler, when she attended a house concert at Naomi Baltuck's and heard a teller who told a story about what happens when you really listen to a story and was pulled into the story-telling world. Friendships led to trips to California to attend Laura Simms workshops. Her telling at the Guild was often of lengthy, near epic, stories. She served on the Board, and encouraged other tellers to develop their skills. She enrolled in the storytelling program at East Tennessee State University (ETSU) and has now completed the program and she fits in nicely with a community of musicians. Patty Zeitlin Most of us have seen Patty Zeitlin at almost every Guild event, at Folklife, and at story swaps. She first came to a Guild Storytelling event 20 years ago. She served on the board for the past 7 years, as secretary for one year and as Vice President for two. She has been the liaison to a number of our venues organizing schedules, and negotiating costs. She is an enthusiastic promoter and organizer of story circles, for new and practiced storytellers to have opportunities to practice their stories. This June she will be 83 years old, with plenty of stories yet to tell. Thank goodness!



Tom Galt is remembered for his leprechaun hat — and ears — Tom has influenced other storytellers through the years, including Norm Brecke, who was amazed at Tom and his style of telling and his offering stories to everyone anytime. He brought his hat rack to Folklife and told stories between the Mural Stage and food trucks. He has been telling stories to anyone who listens in the aisles of Fred Meyer where he walks for his health. For many years he invested a great deal of effort, in the name of the guild and for the benefit of its members, running the Liars' Contest at Folklife and leading Folklife Story Swaps.

George Neiswanger was using storytelling in his teaching when he met UW professor and internationally known storyteller Spencer Shaw, a mentor to so many of us, at his wife's church. Dr. Shaw recommended George join the Seattle Storytellers Guild. He did that, and then attended the big National Storytelling Conference held here in Seattle. There was no looking back! When the monthly programs were held at All for Kids Books and Music near University Village, George was at every program, and always had a story for the story swap. He also served on the Board and has been encouraging to new tellers. He has joined the Elder Tales group who are providing stories in Senior Residences around the area.

- * Earth Tales in April Fine tales by Rick Huddle, Margaret Read MacDonald and Pat Peterson (*Thanks Susy, Eva and Allison*)
- * We revised our Bylaws (through eight drafts and several meetings) (Thanks especially to Anne and Afifi)
- * We saw both Auntmama and Fresh Ground Stories make successful moves to the same new location Olive Way Starbucks (Way to go, MaryAnne!)
- * Naomi Baltuck welcomed us for several House Concerts and Under The Rainbow has prospered under her leadership!! (And her family told some great stories!)
- * Monthly Board meetings either face to face or by Video/ Phone Conferences and lots and lots of e-mails in between. (Thanks to all the board members who engaged in those arduous tasks)
- * Allison and Chris Spengler's work on updating our Membership and reminding people to pay their dues.
- * We have explored a number of venues they aren't cheap! and have some real possibilities for future partnerships both with a number of venues and with various organizations.

Looking ahead

This past year has had a lot of open mikes – but with the Swaps, and with declining attendance at Third Fridays, we see a need for more Featured Tellers – we have some excellent tellers in our membership. Our new venue at the Haller Lake Methodist Church is exciting!

The board has become aware that our programs are not cheap - especially if we are to give quality featured tellers fair compensation for their work and travel expenses. Venues and advertising and refreshments and sound techs all cost money—there are other expenses too. So we will be encouraging *Suggested Donations* at programs. Our more expensive programs may require us to seek grants. The Board hopes to find someone whose sole activity will be pursuing these.

We need to revisit our Mission Statement as a Guild in promoting the art of oral storytelling. There is a lot of competition for storytelling audiences – especially with a number of "personal narrative" events presented by several groups. We need to take an honest look at what we do, what is or isn't working, and to not be afraid to step out in new directions, or revive neglected ones. Some would like to see us expand out of the North Seattle area. We especially need to find ways to bring new (and younger) people into storytelling – and Beginner's classes are definitely needed.

This will be my third term as President of the Guild. I would like to step down from that position at the end of this coming season - so we are looking for someone who might be willing to be trained to take over the office. An added incentive to your serving on the SSG Board - free memberships (yes, even as Pro's)!! I will continue as a board member - but want to have more time for my own storytelling and other things in life.

A SEASON OF CHANGE Important notice!

You do not want <u>this</u> to happen: On Sept. 20th, third Friday of the month you go, at 7:30, as usual, to Haller Lake Community Club, looking forward to a delightful evening of storytelling. You hear music, and see a few dancers practicing. "Oh," you sigh, "the class must be running late." So you wait, and wait and wait. <u>But no one you know shows up!</u> Alarmed? <u>Don't be</u>. Read this article and <u>that</u> won't happen to you,

At 7 P.M. next September 20th, you'll be in a new and beautiful place, at the **Haller Lake Methodist Church**. (13055 1st Ave. N.E.., Seattle 98125.)

We've been fortunate to meet, rent-free, at our "old" place for the past 11 years. The Kaleidoscope Dance Company generously shared their large practice room and stage with us at HLCC. But we've heard from many of you that our Friday evening events start and end too late. The timing has been difficult for the dancers too, especially when they've needed more practice for their twice a year fundraising concerts.



Last year, fortunately, I found a place for our first Friday night SWAPS at the Haller Lake Methodist Church. What had attracted me to it was their community outreach efforts. A homeless camp was set up in their parking lot for several months and there is a large sign in front, welcoming diversity.

They certainly did welcome us! I met Marni, a volunteer office worker, and later on, the minister. Rev. Austin L. Adkinson. They're delighted to have us at the church for First Friday SWAPS, and for workshops, too. And, most recently for our June 23rd Board Retreat, then again in the Fall, for our third Friday ongoing events.

Two rooms are available, one large and one small, both with pass through kitchens. There is handicap accessibility and plenty of free parking in the adjacent lot. The upstairs room at the front door (The Friendship Room) is well lit, with a wall of windows, a stage-like alcove for third Fridays, and comfortable chairs to circle up for our first Friday SWAPS. The church views our events as a valuable community resource, and is providing the space at very low rate. We are grateful.

This Fall, beginning on Sept. 20^{th,} *all* of our third Friday Storytelling events will be held there, earlier than before, from *7 to 9 P.M.* We are planning to have featured tellers, open mics, an evening of Improvisational Stories led by Lance Lambert plus other new offerings.

A question has come up. Will everyone feel comfortable about meeting in a church? That, I agree, is a very important one. As the Dali Lama once said, *Open your arms to change, but don't let go of your values.*

Reverend Adkinson, has been a long time advocate for social justice, and the following is an excerpt from a list of Haller Lake Methodist Church values.

We are an inclusive, loving community for believers, seekers, and skeptics reaching out to people wherever they are on their spiritual journey, in a warm and welcoming atmosphere. We provide an opportunity to serve the local community and beyond, to work for social justice, and inclusiveness.

We value the gifts of the earth, sea, and sky and strive to be good stewards of all God's creation. We recognize that the earth's resources are finite and aim for sustainability.



Last March, 145 urban libraries, including Sno-Isle, Pierce, and King County Libraries, signed a statement of commitment to help all community members realize their full potential by eliminating racial and social equity barriers in library programs, services, policies and practices. The goal is to encourage LGBTQIA+ storytellers to develop their talents, and help LGBTQIA+ participants find their own voices.

In 2015, the Seattle Storytellers Guild began honoring those who were instrumental in founding the Guild and working for its welfare. Twelve honorees were inducted the first year, under Norm Brecke's leadership. In 2017, five more were added. All these special people can be seen on the website, http://seattlestorytellers.org on the Golden Circle Tab. The Audio Presentations by Pat Peterson, Norm Brecke and Judith Alexander are also there.

This year we honored five more of our Guild members at a gala party (plus Annual Meeting), which included cake, fruit, and other snacks, and many of the Golden Circle members, some of whom told stories to round out the evening. Thanks to all the volunteers who helped prepare and present such a great shindig.

The 2019 honorees are:



John Wasko: Although John served on the Board for several years, and as Membership Chair, his contributions often take place behind the scenes— creating the lighting for Haller Lake, advising the Board in email discussions, reconciling Board decisions with Bylaws, smoothing the way for decisions when differing points of view crop up. His warm stories, mostly

personal, have entertained not only the Guild, but also the Forest Storytelling Festival audiences. In 2007, John recorded tellers for a 25th Anniversary of the Guild CD. He not only recorded the tellers, he edited, burned copies, printed images for labels and put them in jewel cases. 150 were available for purchase or as an incentive with a Guild membership. Membership doubled.

His devotion to organizing Earth Day concerts for many years, and writing grants so we could have the events held at the Duwamish Longhouse, has brought many indigenous tellers to the Guild, and heightened awareness of our local tribes. This also led him to Edward Curtis, and the planning of a one-man show to honor a man who spent over 30 years documenting the Native Americans in the West. We look forward to the show when it can be presented - soon we hope!



Patty Zeitlin: Most of us have seen Patty
Zeitlin at almost every Guild event, at Folklife, and at
story swaps. She first came to a Guild Storytelling
event 20 years ago. After hearing Pat and Naomi tell,
she was captured! And the Guild and her church
have benefitted greatly from the experience.
She served on the board for the past 7 years, as
secretary for one year and as Vice President for two.
Her skill at compassionate communication has kept
our Board meetings on task, making sure every

person has a chance to talk, and that the group listens well. She has been the liaison to Haller Lake CC, Creative Dance Center, to a number of other venues and now Haller Lake Methodist Church, organizing schedules, and negotiating costs. As a new Board member, she organized Tellabration, bringing Lorraine Bayes to us, and performing with Norm Brecke, Debra Harris-Branham, Kathya Alexander and Pat Peterson as MC.

She is an enthusiastic promoter and organizer of story circles, for new and practiced storytellers to have opportunities to practice their stories. She has performed at many events, including the Folklife Festival and is the author of short stories, two books, one a songbook for children, poems and many plays (mostly musicals) for adults and children,, as well as recording 8 albums (still available on her website!). This June she will be 83 years old, with plenty of stories yet to tell. Thank goodness!



Tom Galt: Remembered for his leprechaun hat — and ears — Tom has influenced other storytellers through the years, including Norm Brecke who was amazed at Tom and his style of telling and his offering stories to everyone anytime. For example he brought his hatrack to Folklife and told stories between the Mural Stage and food trucks.

He has been telling stories to anyone who listens in the aisles of Fred Meyer where he walks for his health. For many years he invested a great deal of effort, in the name of the guild and for the benefit of its members, running the Liars' Contest at Folklife and leading Folklife Story Swaps.



Mary Brugh: Mary plays the fiddle and was very involved with a music group. When she attended a house concert at Naomi Baltuck's., she heard a teller from New Zealand or Australia who told a story about what happens when you really listen to a story. Slowly, Mary was pulled into the storytelling world.

She met Lenore at a Laura Simms concert. That began a friendship which involved several trips to California to attend Laura Simms workshops. Mary also fondly remembers playing the fiddle while Kevin Cotter told stories at Folk Life. Her telling at the Guild was often of lengthy, near epic, stories. She served on the Board, and encouraged other tellers to develop their skills.



When she found out about the storytelling program at East Tennessee State University (ETSU), she visited and then enrolled. She has now completed the program and she fit in nicely with a community of musicians. As a veteran teller, Mary encourages others, especially beginning tellers, to listen to a variety of storytellers. (Due to shoulder surgery in April, Mary was unable to attend our gala event this year.)



George Neiswanger was using storytelling in his teaching when he met UW professor and internationally known storyteller Spencer Shaw, a mentor to so many of us, at his wife's church. Dr. Shaw recommended George join the Seattle Storytellers Guild. He did that, and then attended the big National Storytelling Conference held here in Seattle. There was no looking back!

When the monthly programs were held at All for Kids Books and Music near University Village, George was at every program, and always had a story for the story swap. He also served on the Board and has been encouraging to new tellers. He has joined the Elder Tales group who have been providing stories in Senior Residences around the area for the past eighteen months.
