Hybrid get-together with Golden Circle! Storytellers! Liars! Workshops! Grants! Epics! Swaps! Oh My!

A 2022-2023 Annual Report by Vice President Judith Alexander and Barry McWilliams



couple of new members, Audra Sisak and Annie Seymour, becoming our new President and Secretary, we hoped to attract some of the younger crowd who tell mostly personal tales. As often happens, the traditional, long-established ideas met forward-looking new enthusiasms. There had to be compromise.

We had a virtual mixture of StoryFests with featured storytellers and other events this year with Barry McWilliams serving as the Zoom Host for these. Under the leadership of Barry and of Marilyn Grevstad, our monthly first Friday story swaps continue on Zoom with a dozen or so folks sharing impromptu tales on a theme. followed by a number of prepared or practice tales.

Our big annual membership meeting and Golden Circle in September was a hybrid event — about 30 in-person attendees and another dozen came via Zoom. Mary Anne Moorman (Auntmama) and Barry McWilliams were inducted into the Golden Circle. They each shared a story — fascinating — followed by other Golden Circle members, including Patty Zeitlin and George Neiswanger (nearing his 100th birthday!). More stories followed, but time ran short, and cake awaited us. Rich refreshments were catered and served by Audra, Anne, Marilyn and Susy. Naomi Baltuck provided CDs as gifts for attendees, and books for the board members.

A number of passings have been noted: Guild members Bergith Kayyali and Jill Johnson passed in recent years. We also lost John Wasko, Tom Galt and Glenn McCauley in 2022. Allison Cox passed very suddenly in October, and Patty Zeitlin succumbed to cancer in March 2023. (See past newsletters in the website archive for memorials.)

Our Treasurer, Anne Brendler, was able to secure a Reopen Grant from King County 4Culture, to get the Guild reimbursed for expenditures for 2022: then she completed another Sustained Support Grant from 4Culture for 2023, which allowed us to invite more nationally known storytellers. Bu Huang brought in some significant matching funds as well. Many thanks are due them.

Eight Guild storytellers stepped in on short notice in October with Spooky Tales when our planned storyteller came down with Covid. November brought us nationally-known Paul Strickland both for a performance and a workshop via Zoom. For Tellabration 2022, we had two exceptional Native American tellers, Alicia Retes and BZ Smith. In December, Diane Ferlatte and musician Eric Pearson decked the halls with story and music. In January, Jen Stone organized and single-handedly produced an impressive two-day, foursession "Crones" epic telling attended by 78 with about 17 tellers from British Columbia to Oregon and beyond. February had Shawn Cornelius' stroke story, and March brought four personal narratives on "luck" in their lives. Two favorite local celebrities, Margaret Read MacDonald and Tom Rawson, shared Earth Day in April with stories and songs with an ecological theme.

What a year to follow that Covid confusion! With a In May, Margaret Read MacDonald donated time for a "Playing with Story" workshop which drew 16 folks who learned to tell 10 stories, which they could start telling immediately, and a chance to exchange experiences over a luscious lunch. The Guild subsidized the workshop with free memberships for all non-member attendees.

> We provided Gene Friese Scholarship help to three members attending Fanning the Embers in the Spring. The Guild is receiving ample donations of books from departed or downsizing members, and Eva Abram has been assembling a library, currently housed at the Shoreline Unitarian Universalist Church.

> The May LiarsFest included nationally known Steve Daut, for a good deal of laughter, and four other "truth stretchers." At the Northwest Folklife Festival, thanks to Larry Hohm's efforts, we had three stages for storytelling. For families, Tom Rawson performed sing-along stories, and a live on-stage adventure story was guided by Leighona Cara. Ghost Stories were presented by Sarah Comer, Mary Anne Moorman, and Larry Hohm. The Liars' Contest was ably organized and MC'd by Marte Fallshore, who handed out two of the trophies to members, and one to a youth teller. June had a lively StoryFest swap of "Borrowed or New" stories told by members and friends. Barry was Zoom Host for the Season..

> By June, our Board had shrunk to nine due to the passing of Allison Cox and Patty Zeitlin; Afifi Durr and Colleen Bollen stepping down for age and health reasons, and the new President deciding not to continue on the board, leaving those offices empty. Anne Brendler desires to turn over the office of Treasurer after six years, and we anticipate making that role much easier with bookkeeping software.

> Our Board continues with Judith Alexander, Larry Hohm, Anne Brendler, Bu Huang, Barry McWilliams, Eva Abram, Annie Seymour. Marte Fallshore, and a new member. Shirley Yovino. No one has come forward to fill the President and Treasurer positions, even now. (See page 10 on descriptions of the officers' roles.) Meetings are online once a month. While we function well as a group in accomplishing our tasks, we could use some more help!

Our annual membership meeting will be an in-person gathering on September 23rd at Naomi Baltuck's home as we start out the new season. Pat Peterson will open up the sharing of stories on an open mike, and there will be plenty of eats. We are hoping that while eating and listening, a couple more volunteers will decide to join the Board and help keep the Guild going into the future.

With mmuch of our audience on Zoom being out of the area, the board decided in July to continue with virtual Swaps and StoryFest events in the next season. We are looking forward to Larry Hohm and Sarah Comer, Norm Brecke and Anne Rutherford, and Ingrid Nixon in our StoryFests this Fall. We do hope for your support in both attendance and donations at these events.



Annual Treasurer's Report Seattle Storytellers' Guild May, 2023

<u>You will note</u>: These reports run from May to May because traditionally we have held our Annual Meetings in the month of June. The Treasurer's Reports were customarily prepared for those Annual Meetings. The pandemic altered our usual meeting month, but I have kept with the May to May Annual Treasurer's Report schedule. This May to May schedule does not coincide with our Fiscal Year, which runs September to September. <u>You will also note</u>: As of 2023, we have more money altogether in our bank accounts, specifically, we have about \$5260 more now.

You may ask how we come to be in the "Black":

We received grants in both years above from 4Culture, one for \$885 and this year's (2022-2023) was in the amount of \$5179. Both of these grants had to be spent in their entirety to cover expenses as per the 4Culture requirement. When we compare years: It is worth noting that this year (2022-2023), our revenue in the Spreadsheet after subtracting expenses is \$1538 more than last year's revenue minus expenses. In July 2023, we received \$2500, also in the Sustained Support program, which was for expenses in our 2022-2023 season. It is not included in our 2022-2023 (May to May) slot on the spreadsheet--because it came in July 2023.

As the Treasurer who has spent several hours on this project, I would like to ask that we look into spending a part of that extra revenue to purchase a computer application to keep track of and work all these numbers for the next Annual Treasurer's Report. Something like Quick Books would make the new Treasurer's life much easier!

Under the Rainbow (UtR) received two grants from the Pride Foundation, which had no spending requirement attached to them. These grants show up in our bank account balances, but the money technically does not "count" as SSG's money. (The spreadsheet details our Revenue and Expenses.) While SSG holds that money for UtR, and that UtR amount shows up in our bank account totals above, that inflates our bank account numbers. UtR has received \$5000 each year listed, but its expenses have totaled less than that in each year. UtR has received from the Pride Foundation \$5,000 in 2021-22 and another \$5,000 in 2022-23023. They drew from those funds \$3,135 for 2021-2022 and \$3,374 for 2022-2023.

What do Seattle Storytellers Guild's Officers Do?

Why do we need a President? A Vice President? A Secretary? A Treasurer?

They are <u>a requirement for our incorporation status</u>, but these offices are not too demanding or difficult. The main commitment is to attend our monthly meetings. In this virtual age, email has a significant role in our operation, and Board meetings are conveniently on Zoom, and recorded for those who might miss one.

What are the Officers tasked to do?

The **President** prepares the agenda for the regular Board meetings and conducts those meetings, keeping Board members in touch with each other and on track with their activities and decisions. As the Guild's "Official" representative, the president may, on occasion, need to sign a contract on behalf of the Guild. The President will write an Annual report for the membership and conduct an Annual Meeting as well.

The **Vice President** fills in when the President is not available, and assists in the overall functioning of the board. In the past, this has included finding venues, connecting with storytellers, etc.

The **Secretary** takes minutes at meetings and distributes them in a timely manner to the Board electronically for any corrections. A good set of minutes helps everyone stay on task, assists the President in preparing agenda for the next meeting, and need to be available for review if questions arise later on. Nowadays, there isn't much written postal correspondence for the Secretary to be deal with.

The **Treasurer** keeps custody of the corporate funds and full and accurate accounts of revenue and expenses. This includes making deposits and paying obligations. Monthly Treasurer's Reports are prepared for the Board meetings, and an Annual Report for the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer handles any filing of tax returns to the City, State, and IRS, and the annual renewal of our city and other business licenses.

The Board as a whole deals with the Guild's business, making decisions and establishing policy. It reviews plans for events, and assigns tasks such as organizing an event or finding a venue. Individuals or committees on the board might be tasked with membership, publicity and social media, fund raising and grants, volunteer recruitment, etc. Figuring out whom to invite to perform for the Guild, and planning events are just two of the aspects of the Board's tasks.

Seattle Storytellers Guild's Board usually meets once a month on Zoom. Guests are welcome to attend any of our meetings! Contact Judith for the info on when and how to come.









