East of the Sun, West of the Moon


Here in Munich, my second home, Goldmund Storytelling Club, is celebrating its 25th birthday this year. I joined soon after the founding, attending many performances, telling stories for a Storytelling Festival and for children, plus traveling with a small group to Scotland and Latvia to work with storytellers there. So when the Club asked if members wanted to perform for the birthday celebrations — in their own communities, however they wished, I volunteered. Another Munich teller, Marion Strencioch, whom I had met once briefly, asked if the two of us could perform together.

She lives in Puchheim, a Western suburb, while I live in Kirchheim, an Eastern suburb, but both librarians were interested. So we set up two dates for German- English Stories, and called the program “East of the Sun / Westlich des Mondes.” The idea was to have sun stories or stories from the East in Kirchheim, and moon stories or stories from the West in Puchheim.

We agreed over internet and Zoom calls which stories to tell, and met once in a third library to practice two stories that we told together, Marion in German and I in English. More Zoom practice, and then, January 24, the first program.



Thirty-five people came and we all had a great time. Marion played various instruments between the stories, and a short break with wine and snacks ensured folks were relaxed for the second half. We began with “The Contest between the Sun and the North Wind,” with me speaking English and Marion speaking German, and then we each told one longer story, in our own language. After the break, we told another bi-lingual tale, adapted from “Why the Moon is Free” from Mexico, and one longer story each again. The applause was enthusiastic enough that we each told a very short story to finish the evening. The audience reaction was flattering and we look forward to March 14 in Puchheim with a new set of stories.

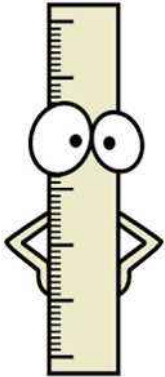

Remembering George Neiswanger (1922-2025)

George Neiswanger was born Nov 9, 1922 in Walla Walla Washington. He passed away on January 15, 2025 after complications from a fall.

He graduated in 1945 from Whitman College in Walla Walla, with honors earning an AB degree in Economics-Business Administration, and a minor in Spanish. George had a career as a Certified Public Accountant, then worked as an instructor at North Seattle College. He served many years on the North Seattle College Education Fund board, where he created the George Neiswanger Endowed Scholarship for NSC students in business or accounting programs, and most recently as a member of the NSC President's Advisory Board at the time of his passing.

George Neiswanger loved history and storytelling. He was already using storytelling in his teaching when he met UW professor and internationally known storyteller Spencer Shaw, a mentor to so many of us, at his wife's church. Dr. Shaw recommended George join the Seattle Storytellers Guild. He did that, and then attended the big National Storytelling Conference held here in Seattle in 1993. There was no looking back!

When the monthly programs were held at All for Kids Books and Music near University Village, George was at every program, and always had a story for the story swap. He also served on the SSG Board for five years, and was especially encouraging to new tellers. George represented Mt Tahoma Storytelling Guild as an opening teller in the 2018 Forest Storytelling Festival and he was so delighted that the telling of his story brought him a standing ovation from the audience. Approaching the age of 100, he joined the Elder Tales group who have been providing stories in Senior Residences around the area in Senior facilities. In 2019, we honored him as a Golden Circle Member for his dedicated outstanding time and effort on behalf of the Guild over the years. Recordings of his stories are in the 2021, 2022 and 2024 Golden Circle Swaps.

His curiosity and passion for lifelong learning, kept him sharp and young at heart. He volunteered his time and talents to many organizations over the years. He was a long time member of the American Rhododendron Society, and while Seattle was his primary chapter, over the years he also participated in the Pilchuck, Whidbey, Tacoma, and Portland chapters. George served as Treasurer, in committee positions, and was awarded an ARS Bronze medal.

George is survived by Irene, his wife of 71 years. Condolences can be sent to:

"I've known George since my first guild meeting 30 years ago. He told a story that night, and when I heard his wonderful voice I thought, "I could never be a storyteller."

"I remember riding to the Port Angeles Festival with him and listening to "For All the Saints," which we both loved. I remember a rainy night when John Clawson, George, and I went to Tacoma to tell stories for the Fireside Storytellers League. I remember the time George arranged for the Guild Board to have a planning retreat in the clubhouse of his condominium and afterward how we looked at Irene's exquisitely decorated eggshells.

"And I will always remember seeing him at the Annual Meeting this past October. He told a story about his mother, and his voice was just as deep and resonant as it was thirty years ago, He told me he regretted that he wouldn't be able to come back in November to hear me tell stories because it was his birthday and he already had several engagements. But somehow he did manage to come. We got into a discussion of our hearing difficulties, and I said that I have trouble with consonants, especially s, t, d, and f. And he said, "Well, those are sibilants, plosives, and fricatives. I wonder what would cause that?" I was completely amazed. He was still way ahead of me.

GENE FRIESE SCHOLARSHIP FUND 2/2025

Many storytellers in our area will remember storyteller Gene Friese and his many bears that traveled with him to so many events. He passed away in 1995, and a scholarship fund was established in his name.

The purpose is to support storytellers in their continuing education, through attending a storytelling festival, conference, workshop, or class.

In the past, the Award (\$100 or less) went to one or two recipients in the Fall for use during the school year. Please see below for the requirements for applying. The Board will consider applications at other times, if funds are available, as they are currently.

The scholarship fund has been augmented by gifts in the past several years, and those wishing to donate may do so on the website, seattlestorytellers.org, or by mailing a check to the SSG Treasurer, Seattle Storytellers Guild, PO Box 18361, Seattle, WA 98118.

To qualify for this scholarship, you must be a resident of Washington or Oregon and be a member of a storytelling guild in Washington, Oregon, or of the National Storytelling Network.

Your application must include the following:

- ◆ Your name, address, phone number, email, and the storytelling guild to which you belong.
- ◆ Your storytelling experience (beginners are encouraged to apply).
- ◆ How you would like to use the scholarship money - a description of the event, limited to 300 words.

Note: The recipient must provide proof of the use of the scholarship (receipt, voucher, ticket stub, etc.) before the check is issued.
