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Live and In-Person Again

We all share the excitement that in person storytelling is gradually coming back.

While Zoom met the challenge forced upon us and kept storytelling going, and formed new virtual communities, most of us long for the return of in-person events. Everyone knows that storytelling before a live audience far surpasses digital storytelling on Zoom.

For the storyteller, there is that energy and nonverbal feedback the audience gives and the joy of captivating them. For the Audience, it is the shared experience as a story comes to life. These things just can not be had in the solitude of an onscreen cubicle at Zoom events. Guilds and storytellers are finding their way back.

However, the return of In-Person storytelling has its own challenges.

Storytelling events on Zoom has been easy. Promotion via social media gathers audiences scattered across the country. People don't have to deal with traffic and parking. Just open up their devices. Even two or three time zones away, familiar faces are on the screen and tales to be told.

In-Person events have to find adequate and affordable venues, centrally located, with parking, comfortable seating, and stages with sound and lighting, and where refreshments can be offered. Extra People are needed to set up and clean up. Storytellers may have travel expenses, and they may need hospitality.

Gathering together an audience of local folks can be a challenge. Posters and Flyers, word of mouth -- how do we get people in the doors? Even before, it was difficult to fill chairs. Now lives are busier, money tighter, and it is much easier to stream entertainment or tap away on personal devices at home. Unless we go Hybrid, many of those new friends we made on Zoom are left out too.

So support your local storytelling events! Make an effort to be there. Take along some friends who haven't yet experienced the joys of story listening. And offer to help. These events will need volunteers to help set up and clean up afterwards. Be generous with donations or buying tickets.



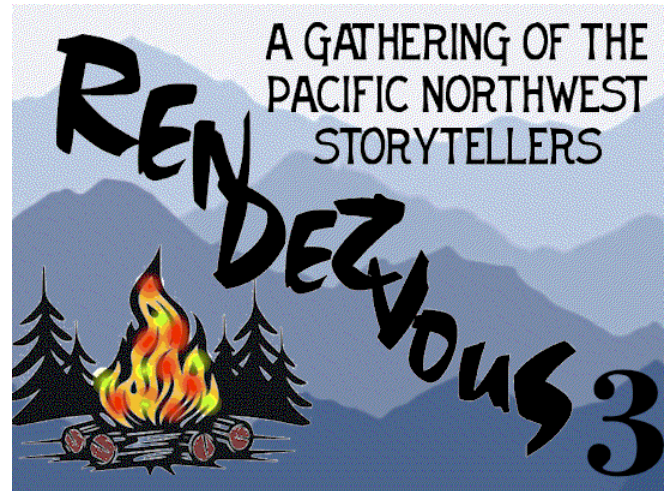

Stories For Climate Change

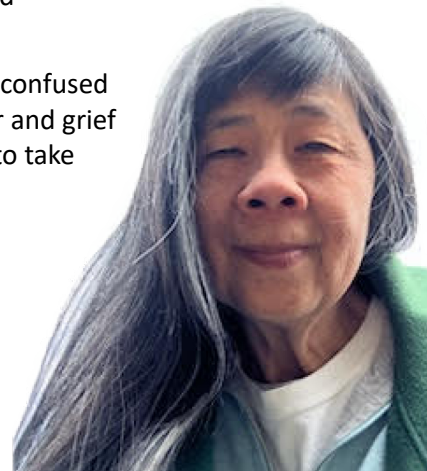

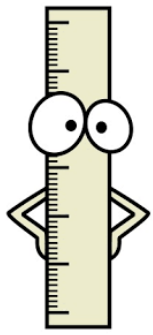


NSN's Environmental Storytelling Special Interest Group

GENE FRIESE SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Many storytellers in our area will remember storyteller Gene Friese and his many bears that traveled with him to so many events. He passed away in 1995, and a scholarship fund was established in his name.

The purpose is to support storytellers in their continuing education, through attending a storytelling festival, conference, workshop, or class.

In the past, the Award (\$100 or less) went to one or two recipients in the Fall for use during the school year. Please see below for the requirements for applying. The Board will consider applications at other times, if funds are available, as they are currently.

The scholarship fund has been augmented by gifts in the past several years, and those wishing to donate may do so on the website, seattlestorytellers.org, or by mailing a check to the SSG Treasurer, Seattle Storytellers Guild, PO Box 166, Auburn, WA, 98071.

To qualify for this scholarship, you must be a resident of Washington or Oregon and be a member of a storytelling guild in Washington, Oregon, or of the National Storytelling Network.



Your application must include the following:

- ◆ Your name, address, phone number, email, and the storytelling guild to which you belong.
- ◆ Your storytelling experience (beginners are encouraged to apply).
- ◆ How you would like to use the scholarship money - a description of the event, limited to 300 words.

Note: The recipient must provide proof of the use of the scholarship (receipt, voucher, ticket stub, etc.) before the check is issued.

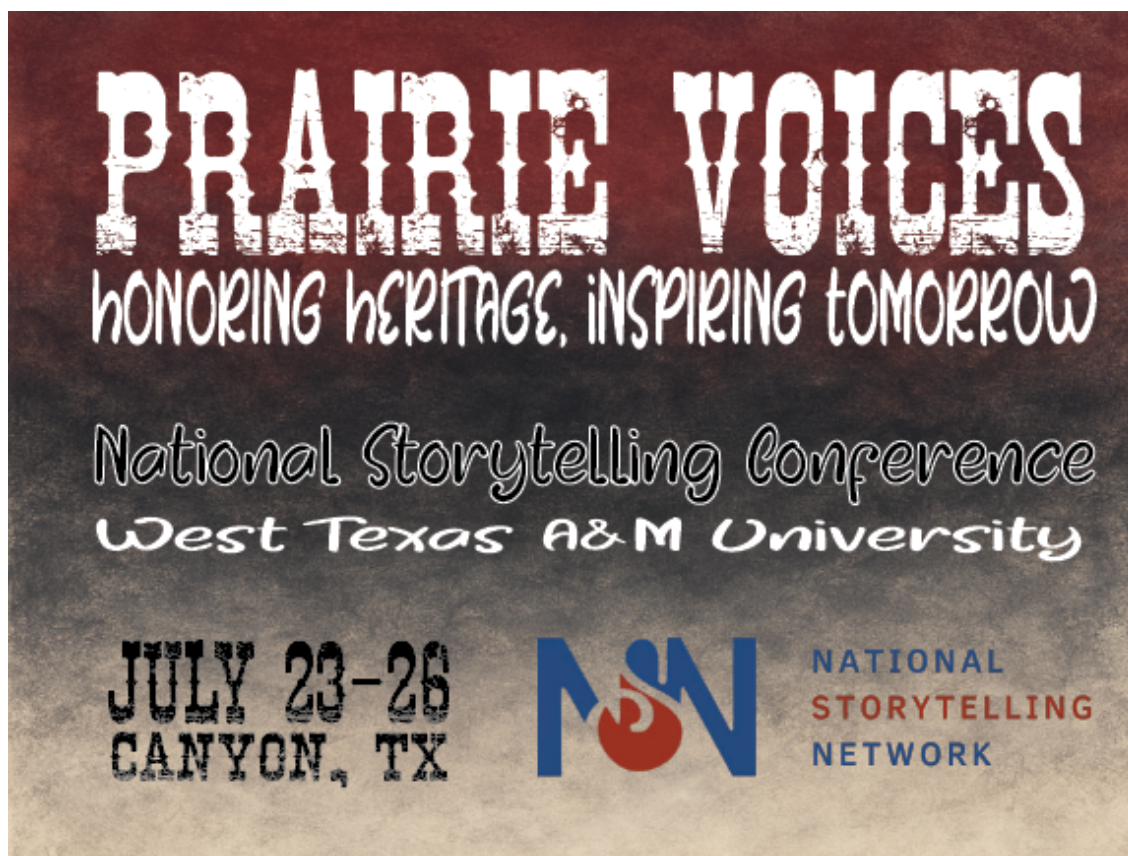
